


Welcome to Risby

Brief history of Risby

It is suggested that the name Risby is derived from the Scandinavian for "The settlement on the rise" or "Settlement on a clearing". There is also a Ryssby in Sweden. Remains of Roman glass found during excavations indicate there has been a settlement here for at least 2000 years.

The settlement was over-run by succeeding invaders, Saxons, Norsemen and Danes. It is believed that the oldest building in the village, the Church Tower was built by our Saxon forefathers as a lookout and refuge against the Danes. The earliest reference to Risby occurs in the 'Chronicle of Ramsey Abbey' published in 973. As a result, this date has been accepted as the 'birth date' of the village. It certainly allowed the villagers to celebrate 1000 years of history in 1973, the date appearing on the village sign.

In the Doomsday Book of 1086 'Risebi' had a population of about 130 and a church with 24 acres of land. In 1327 the citizens of Bury attacked the Abbey and also destroyed one of the manors of Risby, at that time owned by the Abbey.

In the early nineteenth century it was decreed that heath land along the Cavenham road should be sown with crops to provide fuel for the villagers. This area is marked on old maps as 'Risby Poors Heath'. The rental for the land was, and still is, paid to the Risby Charity to which any villager who can show a need can apply for financial help. Grants are paid annually to the Church and local school children.

Geologically the area around Risby is very interesting. In part this is due to the influence and consequence of glacial movement during the Ice Age. The area to the North and West borders Breckland with topsoil's which are generally sandy, supporting varied arable agriculture including vegetables and sugar beet. The 'natural' vegetation is heath land and pine trees. To the South the topsoil is heavier boulder clay. Arable cropping is predominately cereals and grass. Fields are smaller, many with the same boundaries as they were 400 years ago. The 'natural' vegetation is deciduous woodland. To the northwest are low lying Fens, much of which are below sea level and have only been under cultivation for less than 300 years. It can be said Risby is on the boundary of some of the lightest, the heaviest and the youngest agricultural soils in the whole of England.

St Giles Church is now over 1,000 years old and used to have links with the Abbey in Bury St Edmunds. The church is well worth a visit as it has some wonderful stained-glass windows, wall paintings and carvings inside. The stone carved font dates back to the 15th century and there is also a 15th century Medieval Rood Screen which was restored by the Pilgrim Trust in 1966.

Opposite the church is the **Old School** which was built out of flint stone in 1868 at a cost of £600.00. You can still see the carved out cross and bell tower which was used to signal the beginning and end of the school day.

The first and second world wars led to the loss of life of a number of young men from Risby. The **war memorial** erected on the village green in 1920 serves to remind us today of the sacrifice they made for their country.

The **village sign** depicts the church tower, a cross, a plough and some apples linking the past and present, commemorating the village's association with agriculture and the extensive fruit production which took place until very recently when many of the adjoining fields were orchards and owned by the Rothschild family. The sign was dedicated to Thomas Marriage, a local farmer who was tragically killed in the Paris air disaster in 1974.

The historic **thatched barn**, now Risby Barns antique centre in South Street, and the adjoining Risby Place were once the packing house and offices of Risby Fruit Farms.

The **Village Hall** was built in 1923. It was designed by Sir John Wood of Hengrave, who was Lord of the Manor at the time, to show his gratitude for the safe return of his sons from the war. He gave it to the village when it remained unsold in 1952 and continues to be the centre of village life today.

Reporting a Highways problem

The maintenance of most roads, footways and rights of way (footpaths and bridleways) is the responsibility of Suffolk County Council. The easiest way to report the problem would be online via Suffolk County Council's website, however if the problem poses an immediate danger to public safety call **0345 606 6171**.

If the problem is on a trunk road (for example the A14), call Highways England as they are responsible for the major road network in England. The number is **0300 123 5000**.
